

DKGIEF: A Dozen Things to Know About ISF



- 1. The International Speakers Fund (ISF) connects members across borders.
- 2. ISF recipients/speakers share their passion for educational topics.
- 3. The ISF Committee creates a list of applicants to be an ISF speaker.
- 4. The ISF Committee shares that list with state organization presidents who may request an ISF speaker from the list.
- 5. ISF speakers may present virtually or face to face.
- 6. Hosting a virtual/face to face ISF speaker helps break down misconceptions among cultures and environments.
- 7. Being an ISF speaker helps break down misconceptions among cultures and environments.
- 8. ISF Fund is administered by the DKG International Educators Foundation (DKGIEF).
- 9. YOU can apply to be an ISF speaker.
- 10. YOU can apply to host an ISF speaker.
- 11. ISF is supported by donations to the DKGIEF to cover travel expenses to face-to-face state organization events.
- 12. EVERYBODY can contribute to the ISF Fund and foster international understanding.

SEE Support for Early Career Educators

In order to share the vision, Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide, and strengthen our Society, the Educational Excellence Committee established Supporting Early-career Educators (SEE) as its second international project during the 2012 International Convention in New York City.

Why is our support needed?

Education is a challenging career and retaining quality teachers is an issue worldwide. According to Richard Ingersoll, the rate in U.S. of beginning teachers leaving the profession in the first year is a little more than 10%; with 33% leaving by Year 3 and 46% by Year 5. In addition, around 15% of U.S. teachers overall leave the profession each year. (Is There Really a Teacher Shortage, Ingersoll, 2003, p. 14)

Schools that have depended on a core of veteran teachers are seeing those teachers retire. As much is expected of a new teacher on the first day of school as is expected of a 30-year veteran. Teachers supporting teachers is crucial.

John F. Kennedy said, "In each one of us there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefits for everyone and a greater strength for our nations."

We truly can make a difference with our support.


SEE encourages members/chapters to be creative in support of early-career educators with a variety of strategies, such as

Breakfast was enjoyed ahead of the program and business meeting.

Donna Boyles shared words of inspiration reminding us to exhibit the fruits of the spirit by focusing on the good around us.

Debbie Merritt introduced April Roberson, a neurofeedback clinician and the owner of *A Restored Mind*. Mrs. Roberson shared information on neurofeedback, a data-based clinical practice that is a non-drug, reward-based training system for one's brain. Neurofeedback may be utilized to decrease negative symptoms or behaviors associated with anxiety-depression, attention deficits, behavior disorders, migraines, emotional disturbances, PTSD, and autism.

Business Meeting

With no additions or corrections, the minutes of the December meeting were approved as shared in the newsletter.

The treasurer's report was approved as shared by Rhonda Jackson. It was shared that we do not yet have a budget.

Old Business

Debbie Merritt encouraged members to participate in the upcoming NC DKG State Convention to be held in Asheville April 29-May 1. Complete details regarding the convention can be found on the NC DKG website.

New Business:

Committee Reports

On behalf of the Membership Committee, Cindy Roberts presented a list of 38 prospective members. It was clarified that this is a larger-than-normal list, but as we are a still-growing group; a broad, diverse, pool of prospective members would serve us well moving forward. A voting ballot was shared. From the submitted votes, prospective members will be contacted and an orientation will be held for those interested. The Beginning Teacher Committee met recently and made Valentine's goody bags to be distributed by SCS courier around Feb 14.

They are also in need of new board books for toddlers and young readers. It was decided that members will bring board books to the next meeting to be donated to Stokes Partnership.

As reported by Donna Boyles, the Teacher Market has been open a few days since January. Online orders are on the increase and are being delivered by SCS courier. A recent \$5,000 donation is nearly depleted as a large order to replenish supplies was filled. Donations of supplies are appreciated. However monetary donations go farther to fulfill the specific requests of teachers.

Deanne Moore, on behalf of the World Fellowship committee, shared some research on this effort. World Fellowship encourages international, quality education. Donations fund grants to study abroad and improve the landscape of education worldwide.

Door prize winners were selected.

Debbie Merritt reminded executive board members and committee chairs about the planning meeting scheduled for Feb. 21 at Bethel Baptist Church.

Members were also reminded that dues (\$70) would be collected at the April meeting.
